PROGRAM NOTES BY BECCA EHLERS

1833 would mark the end of slavery in the United Kingdom with the passage of the Slavery Abolition Act; while slavery had been illegal in England and Wales since 1772 and the slave trade itself had been outlawed in the British Empire since 1807, slavery had remained a major source of labor in the British-occupied West Indies. This labor was responsible for providing cheap agricultural commodities to the British, particularly sugar. However, majority opinion turned towards being antislavery, with many large-scale public protests (some bordering on riots) and petitions to Parliament. While the pro-slavery faction was in the minority, it was very vocal and insisted on a need for slave labor based not only on Britain's economic benefits from their labor, but also on theories of "scientific racism" that painted those of African descent as inferior.

Ultimately, while the decision to end slavery may have seemed to be made in the interest of strong ethics, it was an inevitable development as Britain's economic needs changed; as land in the West Indies became exhausted by extensive cultivation, East Indian agricultural commodities became the more economically viable option and the focus of British colonialism.

Acting, as an art, also underwent a transformation in the 1800s. Two schools of thought, the classical (or "teapot") and domestic styles, were among those in competition for actors. The classical school of acting focused on highly stylized vocals and physical stances; actors would stand with a hand on their hip and the other arm outstretched, like a teapot's handle and spout, and recite their lines. In contrast, the domestic style of acting was based around giving stronger connections between characters and acting a part out more like a person would behave in real life – closer to what most actors would do today.

Othello was exceptionally popular in the UK through the 18th and 19th centuries; the title role was sought after by popular actors as a standard of success. During the Restoration in Britain, Othello was one of the few Shakespeare plays that was never adapted or changed. Breaking with the tradition of men playing both male and female roles in theatre, a 1660 production of Othello also marked the first time a woman performed onstage in England, when actress Margaret Hughes played Desdemona.

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
